

Only 3% of the people in Cracow, Poland, intend to get the swine flu jab

27 October 2009: Only 3 % of the people in Cracow, Poland, intend to get the swine flu jab according to a poll carried out by Sanepid and reported on Radio Cracow. In Poland, the information about the dangers of the vaccines have been very actively spread online and the horrible deaths of several homeless people due to a "secret" vaccine experiment is still discussed in Poland.

Only 7% of the people in Luxembourg intend to get the swine flu jab

27 October 2009: Only 7 % of the people in Luxembourg intend to get the swine flu jab, according to a recent representative poll by TNS ILRES. 77 % have no intention of getting the vaccine while 15 % are undecided. The number of people who said they were worried about the "swine flu" pandemic was 9 % compared to 42 % who said they were not worried. Another 32 % per cent said they were a little worried. Altogether 46 % of the people asked said they thought that the swine flu vaccination campaign was out of proportion considering the danger, while 41 % expressed concerns about the safety of the vaccine.

Only 17% in France now wants the "swine flu" vaccine - down from 55%

27 October 2009: According to the French mainstream newspaper Le Monde, the number of people in France who are planning to take the swine flu jab has dropped dramatically in the last month, falling from 55% in the middle of September to just 17 % today. The latest poll also showed that the number of people who were worried about the "swine flu" pandemic had fallen from 32 % to just 16 % in the same period. As many as one person in two is opposed to the "swine flu" jab. The poll of 965 people was first printed in Dimanche Ouest-France.

Fewer than 10 people turn up for swine flu jab on first day in Salzburg, Austria

28 October 2009: Fewer than ten people turned up to get the swine flu jab in the Salzburg's vaccine centers on Tuesday, the first day when the jabs were available, reports Austria's state-run TV, the ORF. Norbert Muss, the head doctor of the regional health insurance association, said that the organisation had prepared for a run on the jabs.

"The organizational situation is the same as if you invite people to a party and you don't know whether to make three or 5,000 sandwiches, he said. "Right now the demand among health personnel is not overwhelming," he said. He attributed the low turn out to a "certain tiredness with being vaccinated on the one hand and on the other hand there has been a discussion about the vaccine."

In the next two weeks only doctors, nurses and other health care workers in Austria are to get the swine flu jab under government plans with the rest of the population due to be vaccinated from November 9th.
